Trip Around the World – Hand Pieced



Cut 2 ½"strips across the width of your fabric, then cross cut into 2 ½"squares. Use a piece of template plastic 2"square to mark sewing lines within the cut squares.

You can cut 16 squares from one strip across the width of the fabric. Each round requires 4 more squares than the previous round.

To start, make a 9 patch block. Use two different colours. Choose a third colour, and add 4 squares to the middle edge of the 9 patch block.



From there on, add rounds of squares slotted between the squares on the previous round.

The nine patch with the added 4 pieces are considered round 1

Round 2 – 12 Squares

Round 3 - 16 squares

Round 4 - 20 squares - 2 strips of fabric

Round 5 – 24 squares

Round 6 – 28

Round 7 – 32 squares - 2 strips of fabric

Round 8 – 36 squares – 3 strips 7.5" fabric

Round 9 - 40 squares

Round 10 – 44 squares

Round 11 - 48 squares -

Round 12 – 52 squares 4 strips 10" fabric

Round 13 – 56 squares
```

Round 14 – 60 squares

Round 15 – 64 squares - 5 strips 12.5 "fabric

Round 16 – 68

Round 17 - 72

Round 18 - 76

Round 19 - 80 -

Round 20 - 84 - 6 strips - 15" of fabric

Round 21 - 88

Round 22 - 92

Round 23 - 96

Round 24 - - 100 - 7 strips - 17 ½"fabric (half a metre)

Just keep adding 4 more squares to each round until your quilt is big enough.

If you run out of a colour in any round, use another fabric, of the same colour, and alternate the two fabrics,
